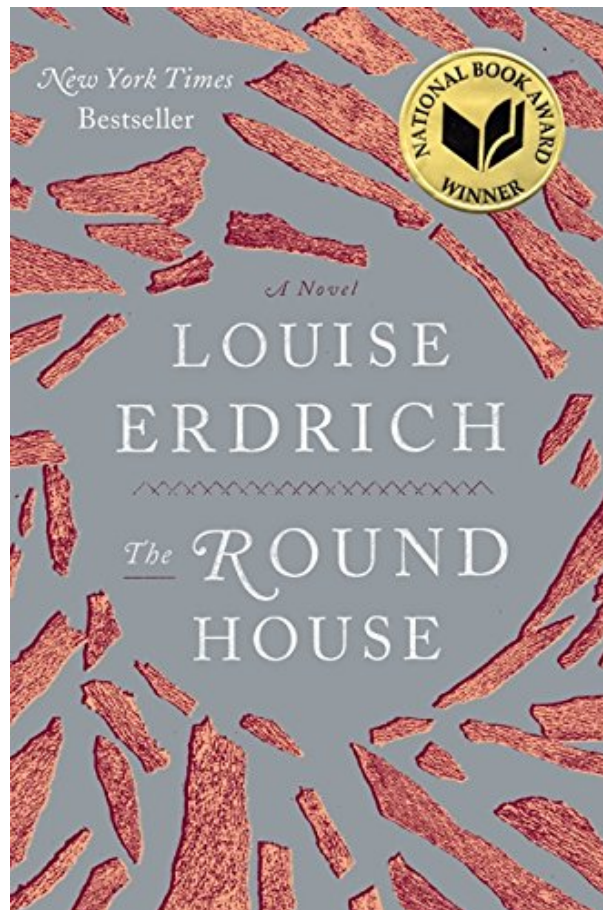
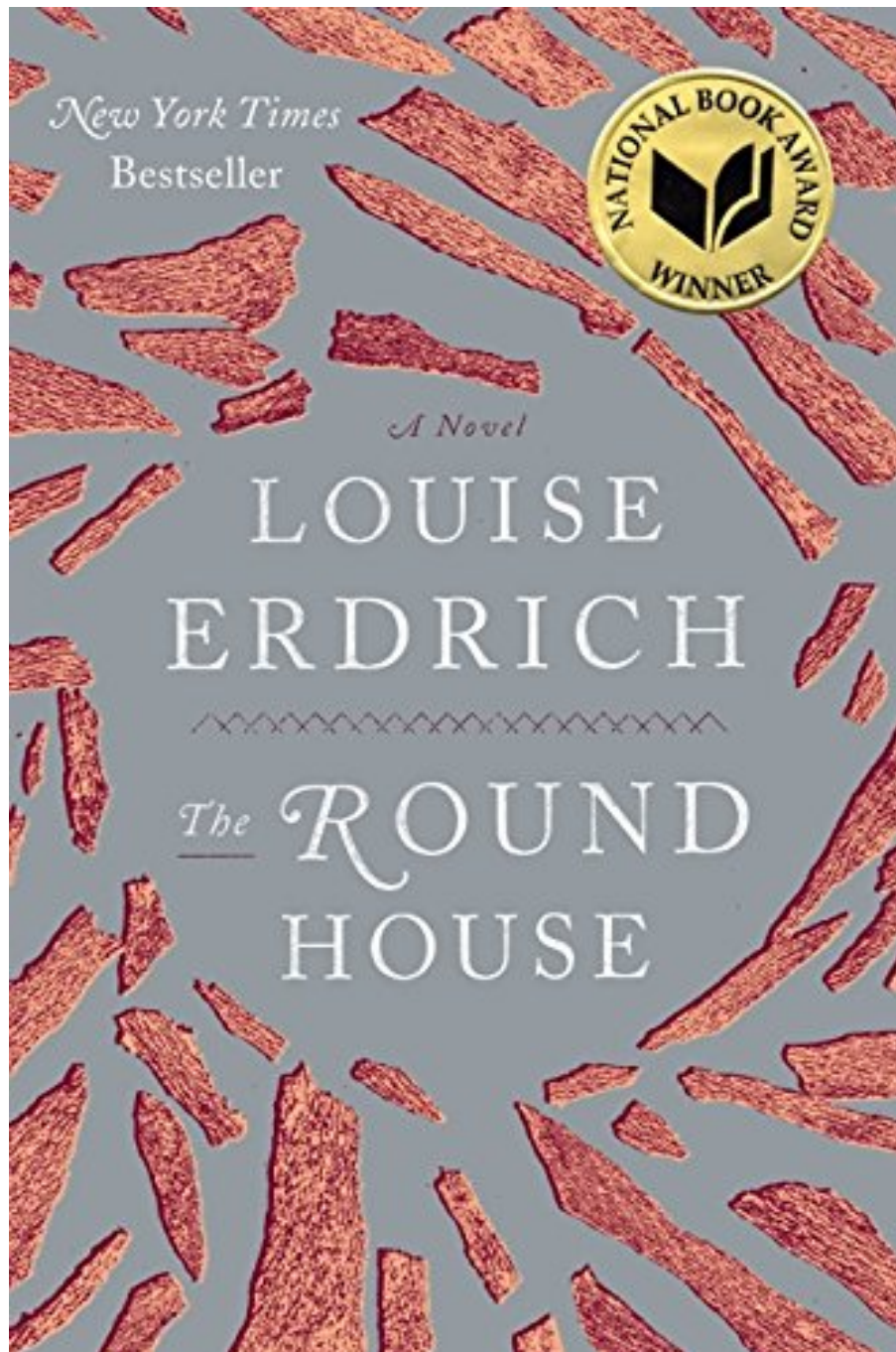


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The Round House won the National Book Award for fiction.

Storytelling at its finest

I've read numerous of Erdrich's novels. This one has a special voice, reminiscent of Sherman Alexie's-- a bit of American Indian humor, an informality appropriate to a male adolescent narrator or protagonist, a constant awareness that growing up on a reservation results in experiencing situations that feel surreal and, too often, destructive. In *The Round House*, Erdrich takes the heritage and history of the Chippewa/Ojibwe and the more diverse American Indian nations as common knowledge. She makes references to events and people that are surely familiar to Native Americans who have cared to understand their contemporary culture and its roots. For example, Vine Deloria, Jr. is mentioned in passing, but understanding the similarities and contrasts between Deloria and the protagonist's father enriches the narrative... if the reader has knowledge of Deloria's role in contemporary Native American struggles. The protagonist's character is drawn almost flawlessly. His thoughts and feelings ring true as those of an early adolescent whose mother has been brutally attacked. This accurate depiction continues to the last word of the book. The writing is superlative. Finally, I'd like to commend Erdrich for devoting her labors to exposing a most horrible fact of reservation life in the 21st century: Women are being raped and violently injured in alarming numbers (of course any number greater than zero is alarming, but Erdrich shares with the reader in her postscript just how extensive this problem is on reservations). By focusing on the impact on the son of a woman brutally attacked, Erdrich reminds us that while the permanent damage the woman experiences is horrific, the entire community also suffers and experiences permanent psychological damage.
